HDLU – MEŠTROVIĆ PAVILION

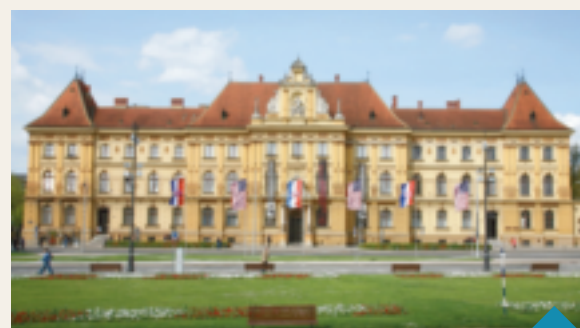
Home of the Croatian Association of Artists (HDLU) is a gallery space run by artists. Also known as the Meštrović Pavilion, this magnificent architectural piece was built in 1938 and designed by Croatian most prominent sculptor Ivan Meštrović. Although inaugurated as a gallery, after only few years, during the WWII and due to a political decision it was converted to an Islamic mosque. Since the end of WWII until the independence of Croatia (1992.), the space was converted to Museum of National Resolution. From the beginning of the 90s until now it is run by the Croatian Association of Fine Artists where a contemporary fine arts program is delivered in 3 galleries (Bačva, Prsten, PM) situated in the Pavilion.

MUSEUM OF ARTS AND CRAFTS

Visit MUO - the oldest and largest museum of fine and applied arts and design in Croatia that has in its collections more than a hundred thousand objects spanning **from the 13th century to the present**. On the three floors of the Museum can be seen the most representative artworks of Croatian and European art production from the Gothic period to the 21st century, which present **the greatest art exhibition through styles and periods in this area**. On the first two floors, there is a selection of artworks from the Gothic period to Art Déco, while the third floor exhibits selections from the collections of glass, ceramics, watches, ivory, metal and fashion collections exhibited.

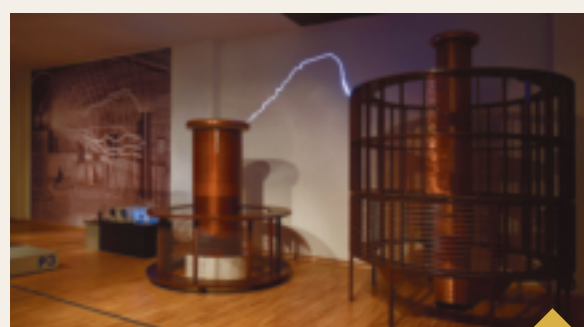

BLESSED ALOJZIJE STEPINAC

Blessed Alojzije Stepinac, Archbishop of Zagreb and Cardinal, was born in 1898. in Brezarić (Krašić). He was ordained a priest in Rome in 1930. and appointed Archbishop in 1937. At the time of his political process, in 1946, the communist regime sentenced him to 16 years of prison. Pope Pius XII announces Stepinac's elevation to a cardinal in 1953. He died in Krašić in 1960. on the note of holiness and martyrdom. He was buried in the cathedral of Zagreb. His grave is a place of constant prayer and listening. Pope John Paul II beatified him in Marija Bistrica, 1998.

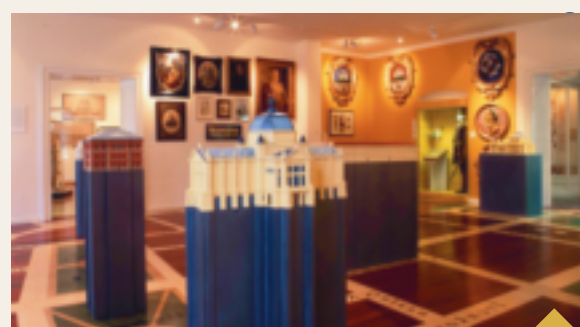

ZAGREB CITY MUSEUM

The Zagreb City Museum, founded in 1907, is today the largest city museum in the Republic of Croatia. The museum's historically stratified architectural complex was fully renovated (1993-1998) and now expands to six thousand square metres. The museum's permanent display was opened in 1998. Portraying the city, the museum conveys a message of Zagreb's identity and cultural heritage from ancient history (archaeological findings presented in situ) to the present day.

DRAŽEN PETROVIĆ MUSEUM AND MEMORIAL CENTER

The museum is dedicated to Croatian basketball player Dražen Petrović who is most notably famous for being the first Croatian and one of the very first Europeans to play in the NBA. He is one of the greatest sportsmen in Croatia and is listed as one of the 50 basketball players to greatly influence basketball Euroleague. During his career he played for Šibenka, Cibona, Real Madrid, Portland Trail Blazers and NJ Nets. He won 3 Olympic medals. The museum exhibition follows Dražen's life and career path through personal objects and various medals, trophies and honors he received in 28 years.

ATELIER MEŠTROVIĆ IN ZAGREB

The former home of Ivan Meštrović, the most famous Croatian sculptor

The Atelier Meštrović is an attractive exhibition space of memorial character, located in the old part of Zagreb close to St. Mark's church. It preserves the authentic atmosphere of life and work of Ivan Meštrović (1883-1962), who studied in Vienna and worked and exhibited in the artistic and cultural centres of Europe and USA.

Meštrović won a Grand Prix for sculpture at the International Exhibition in Rome (1911) and was the first croatian artist who exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York (1947).

MUSEUM OF BROKEN RELATIONSHIPS

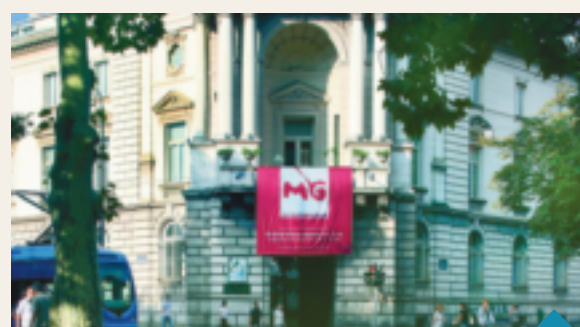

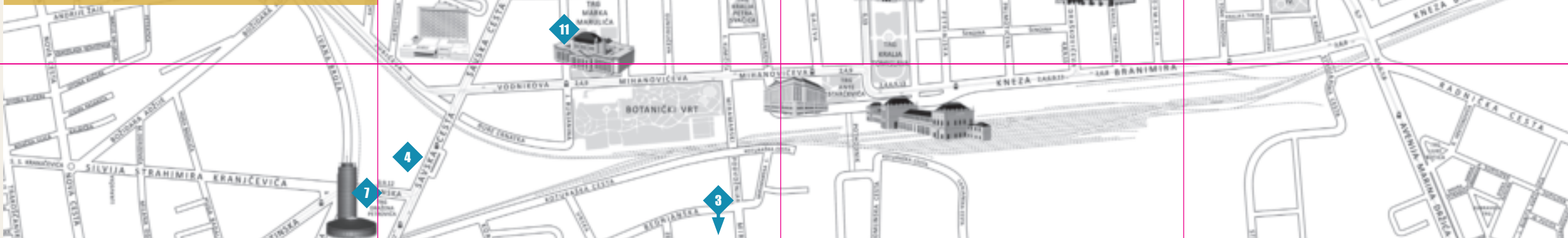

THE CROATIAN STATE ARCHIVES

The Croatian State Archives (CSA) is the central archival institution in Croatia. It was founded in 1643 and from 1913 is situated in one of the most beautiful art nouveau buildings in Croatia. The archival material dated from 999 till nowadays is arranged in more than 2100 fonds and collections. This material is mainly created by central administrative and judicial bodies, but also by prominent Croatian families and persons. CSA also keeps two million photographs and collections of national and foreign films housed in the Croatian Cinematheque, which is a part of CSA.

THE MIMARA MUSEUM

The Mimara Museum opened on 17 July 1987 at Roosevelt Square 5 in Zagreb. The collection consists of the art collection which Ante Topić Mimara (1898 – 1987) donated to his homeland in 1973. The inventory of the Mimara Museum comprises around 3750 art objects that belong to the world's heritage. The permanent exhibition houses and exhibits the ancient civilizations collection, European sculpture, ivory collection, the collection of Far Eastern art, various collections of European applied art from all periods of western art history and the rich painting collection.

MINI TRAIN MUSEUM

In the heart of Zagreb, in Gundulićeva street Nr. 4, there is a Mini train museum with the largest layout in the South Eastern Europe. After 10 years of enthusiastic but hard work, on the surface of more than 100 m², today you can find: 150 lokomotives, 1.000 wagons, 1,5 km of tracks and more than 2.500 everyday life details. Apart from trains and tracks there is also 30 m of roads with induction powered vehicles. Special light and sound effects offer an unique atmosphere to the visitors who can also experience the drive in the playroom, steering mini trains with Tablets.

DID YOU KNOW

Technical Museum Nikola Tesla

The Technical Museum Nikola Tesla buildings were built in 1949, as exhibition space of the Zagreb Fair on the site of the first tramway depots of today's ZET (1891—1936).

MUO

Did you know that the first floor Gallery in Museum of Arts and Crafts features the masterpieces of European Baroque painting of the most important painters of the time - Italian, French and Dutch, such as the works of Guido Reni, Rembrandt's student Jan Victors and others.

MSU

Opened 65 years ago (1954) MSU - Museum of Contemporary Art, Zagreb is one of the first-established museums of contemporary art in the world.

Dražen Petrović museum and memorial center

Museum and memorial center Dražen Petrović is the only known museum in the world dedicated to one basketball player.

Zagreb City Museum

The courtyard of the Zagreb City Museum is graced by the oldest painted wall sundial in Zagreb, the symbol of the Museum, which still shows the right time.

Mini train museum

Did you know that the Mini train museum in Zagreb has a largest layout in South Eastern Europe with the several worldwide unique attractions: layout on two floors connected with the special elevator for trains, ski aerea with the skiers in motion, induction powered vehicles and exchange of day and night with the simulation of storm and rain?

The Croatian State Archives

The Croatian State Archives stores almost thirty linear kilometres of archival material, which exceeds the distance between Zagreb and The Zagreb Airport! The smallest document is a Mezuzah – a piece of parchment with specific Hebrew verses from Torah, which consist of the Jewish prayer Sh'ma Yisrael. This parchment is affixed to the doorpost of Jewish homes.

ATELIER MEŠTROVIĆ

ALTHOUGH HE IS MOST FAMOUS AS A SCULPTOR, Ivan Meštrović studied architecture with professor Friedrich Ohmann at the Vienna Academy of Fine Arts from 1904 to 1906. With a group of other architects, he designed the Home of Croatian Association of Artists (1934-1938) in Zagreb, also known as the "Meštrović Pavilion".

Cardinal Alojzije Stepinac and saving the Jews in Croatia during the WW2

Already in 1936 Stepinac began to support materially and by other means Jewish refugees from Germany and Austria in Croatia. In 1937, while only 39 years old, he became Archbishop. In 1938 he founded "Action for help to refugees." In January 11, 1939 he sent a request to 298 addresses of eminent Croats asking for help.

HDLU

This prominent gallery space which showcases contemporary art changed its design and purpose 4 times over the past 80 years; besides being a gallery, it was for 1 year an Islamic mosque and then for 5 decades Museum of Revolution.

Modern Gallery

Did you know that the permanent exhibition of the Modern Gallery houses the original prototype models of two Classicist monumental statues? Namely, St. George Slaying the Dragon (at the square stretching between the Croatian National Theatre and the Academy of Music) and the Equestrian Statue of Governor Josip Jelačić (at the main city square named after the Governor) by Austrian sculptor Anton Dominik Fernkorn.
